- 2. I will <u>push for equity</u> until secondary school music programs are, in fact, equitable. They are not. These are my simple criteria:
- a. That student body demographics are reflected in every single class/ensemble (i.e., race, class, gender)
- b. That curriculum is decolonized (Western art music is not centered) and addresses national core arts standards with frequency in every single class and ensemble.
- I will seek joy, sincerity and community.
 This is the entire reason I became a

- music teacher and I won't lose my path.
- 4. I will <u>not be a gatekeeper</u>. My job is to open doors for students and teachers, not to close those doors.
- 5. I accept that I cannot, and should not, do it alone. None of us can be everything to everyone all the time. Let's stop trying. It's time to accept community support and help from colleagues. It's time to band together, boldly. This isn't a weakness, but a strength to our teaching.

So... out with snobbery and in with joy. Out with gatekeeping and in with access. Out with the "play book" and in with discovery. Out with antiquated and in with exploration. I'm going to keep walking this path with or without you, but it'd sure be a whole lot cooler if you come along.

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
